

Upjohn Travelling Fellowships

for General Practitioners

In 1973 Upjohn Limited is once more making available grants of up to £200 to enable Doctors in General Practice to undertake postgraduate courses of their own choice or design within the British Isles (other than those available under Section 63).

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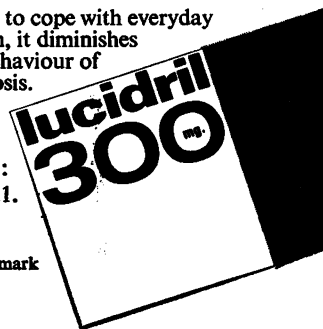
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
