Sir,

The Green Paper and the whole general attitude of the present trend of medical thought seems to me to be drifting further and further from the ethical concept of medical practice. It would seem to me that we are being pushed into a system in which confidence is lacking, because the integrity of records is absent, and that we shall be forced to share our opinions with people who have a purely economic and social attitude towards the individual. If State medicine is drifting towards expediency, and the concept of medicine for any other reason than service, e.g. medicine in the interest of the majority, then the Hippocratic structure is doomed and I, for one, want no part of it. We shall be little better than the Aztecs, ripping out hearts to mollify the new Sun God of scientific medicine.

Acheson (Journal of the Royal College of General Practitioners, 1970, 19,107) are mutilating operations. Surely the technique described by Mr Gwynne Williams in Minor surgery and bandaging, 1924 is less destructive. "With a needle the cuticle overlapping the base of the nail may be gently lifted until the blood is reached, when it can be expressed."
