on A4 records and other more advanced forms of record-keeping now replaces the one showing FP5 and FP6. It is also proposed to mount a display on influenza, which is being lent by the Swansea Research Unit.

Messrs Keeler have mounted a new display in the cabinets, and the Medical Recording Service have arranged for a number of tapes to be available for visitors to hear on the study unit in the POC room.

The face of general practice has changed in the ten years that the Practice Organization Study has been running, and it is desirable to reflect some of the current changes. Participants in the Practice Organization Study will therefore receive a new questionnaire soon, which will allow us to demonstrate more information about their practices.

The Practice Organization Committee (Study Group) has printed a report on appointment systems in general practice, which reviews current practices and recommendations on the optimum use of appointment systems. It is obtainable from the Secretary to the Practice Organization Committee, 14 Princes Gate, London SW7 1PU, price £1.50.

A number of portable displays on practice organization themes are also available for loan on application to the Secretary at the above address.

BACK PAIN

The Department of Health and Social Security has formed a new working group under the chairmanship of Professor A. Cochrane to study back pain. The membership includes three general practitioners, Dr M. E. Barker of Stamford, Dr C. A. Pragnell of London, and Dr D. J. Price of Waltonon-Thames.

HEALTH SERVICES BILL

The Health Services Bill, which will separate private pay beds from NHS hospitals, received the Royal Assent in November 1976. The first effect will be the phasing out within six months of 1,000 of the total of 4,444 pay beds at present within the NHS.

Thereafter, progressive phasing out of the remaining pay beds will be in the hands of an Independent Health Services Board, consisting of a chairman and four other members appointed by the Secretary of State. The composition will include two doctors and two persons appointed after consultation with other NHS staff and patient interests.

NATIONAL MARRIAGE GUIDANCE COUNCIL

The National Marriage Guidance Council has recently revised three booklists and is prepared to send these to readers of the Journal of the Royal College of General Practitioners, provided a stamped addressed envelope is enclosed.

HEALTH AUTHORITY BUDGETS

Mr David Ennals, Secretary of State for Social Services, warned health authorities in November 1976 that cash limits would be firmly imposed and any excess spending during the year would be deducted from the next year's cash allocation. "It is best to be clear and frank, rather than to leave room for doubt."

WALES

Infant mortality

In the year 1975 the number of infants dying under one year of age (infant mortality) fell below 500 for the first time

The actual figure was 492, of whom 127 were attributed to congenital abnormalities, 359 to 'other causes'.

Expectation of life

Expectation of life in Wales at present is 68.0 years for males and 74.6 years for females.

Disciplinary action against general practitioners

In Wales in 1975 there were 38 service committee cases in which general medical practitioners were involved. No breach was found in 34, and in four cases a breach of general medical services was found.

Number of prescriptions per health service patient

The number of prescriptions per health service patient in Wales in the years 1971 to 1975 inclusive, was: 7.20, 7.40, 7.61, 7.87 and 8.07 prescriptions per patient per year.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON POSTGRADUATE TRAINING FOR GENERAL PRACTICE

The Joint Committee on Postgraduate Training for General Practice and the Royal College of General Practitioners have now approved the vocational training schemes at Burnley, Bury, Oldham, Rotherham and Warrington/University of Liverpool Family Practice Teaching Unit for a period of two years.

The following vocational training schemes have been re-approved for a period of five years: Barnstaple, Exeter, Southend (South Essex), Taunton, Wrexham, and Yeovil.

All these schemes are recognized by the Royal College of General Practitioners for the purposes of the MRCGP examination.

BRIGGS REPORT

The Secretary of State for Social Services, Mr David Ennals, has reaffirmed the Government's firm commitment to introduce legislation implementing the main recommendations of the Briggs Committee on Nursing, as soon as parliamentary time allows.
