In 1976 the Committee on Safety of Medicines received 6,490 notifications of suspected adverse reactions to medicinal products, compared with 5,052 in 1975.

The Committee has recommended that preparations containing more than 50 micrograms of oestrogen should no longer be promoted or recommended for contraception, and a voluntary agreement was secured with the pharmaceutical industry to act upon these recommendations.

COST OF THE NHS

The estimated cost of the NHS and personal social services in the year ending March 1977 was $\pounds 6,215$ million. The cost of social security benefits at December 1976 rates is estimated at $\pounds 11,563$ million.

Mr. David Ennals, Secretary of State for the Social Services, has announced the Government's priorities, which are:

1. Fairer shares of Government money for less well-off regions across the country.

2. Better treatment for the 'Cinderella services'—those for the mentally ill, the mentally and physically handicapped, and the elderly.

3. Increased support for families, e.g. the introduction of child benefit for all children.

The Good Neighbour campaign to help elderly, disabled, and lonely people in their homes is to be stepped up, and the economies include:

1. A five per cent cut nationally in health authorities' management costs from the March 1976 level.

2. A reduction in staff of up to ten per cent in some parts of the Department's headquarters.

BRITISH PHARMACEUTICAL CONFERENCE

The British Pharmaceutical Conference was held in Sheffield in 1977. Sir

George Godber, Chairman of the Health Education Council, proposed the toast of "The British Pharmaceutical Conference and the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain". In his speech Sir George said that the future of medicine required recognition of a "greater medical profession" which included other professionals concerned with health and was certainly not now to be dominated by medicine as it once had been. He considered that there should be something "specially close about the mix between medicine and pharmacy, and I am going to say bluntly that I do not think it is as close as it should be".

JOINT COMMITTEE ON POSTGRADUATE TRAINING FOR GENERAL PRACTICE

The Joint Committee on Postgraduate Training for General Practice and the Royal College of General Practitioners have re-approved the vocational training scheme at Bromsgrove, Falkirk, Oxford 1 and 2, and University College Hospital, London.

These schemes are recognized by the Royal College of General Practitioners for the purpose of the MRCGP examination.

SCREENING FOR HYPERTENSION

The British Medical Association's General Medical Services Committee is opposed to pharmacists screening patients for hypertension. At a meeting held on 27 October between representatives of the GMSC and the Pharmaceutical Society, to discuss Merck Sharp and Dohme's proposed pilot scheme, the GMSC representatives indicated that they were opposed to pharmacists screening for hypertension generally, and under the pilot scheme in particular, and that the GMSC intended to write to Merck Sharp and Dohme to dissuade it from carrying on with the scheme.

The Pharmaceutical Society's Council has already agreed that Merck Sharp and Dohme should proceed in involving pharmacists in the scheme providing that each pharmacist obtains the approval of a local general medical practitioner and agrees with that general practitioner the level of blood pressure at which the patient should be referred to him.
