STATUTORY LABELLING SCHEME FOR DANGEROUS CHEMICALS

Regulations drawn up by the Health and Safety Commission and made jointly by the Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Employment and the Minister of State for Prices and Consumer Protection implement within Great Britain an EEC Directive on the packaging and labelling of dangerous substances.


These regulations have been prepared in consultation with the TUC, the CBI, and trade and consumer organizations and are the first step towards a standardized scheme throughout the EEC for the labelling of all hazardous substances. Implementation will be in two

stages according to container size. Suppliers have until 1 September 1978 to put labels on containers with a capacity of 200 litres or more and until 1 March 1979 to label containers with a capacity of less than 200 litres.

The basic idea of the scheme, which covers such chemicals as acetaldehyde, concentrated nitric acid, hydrofluoric acid, and mercury compounds, is that by reading a simple label the user of a listed substance will be able to gain quick but important guidance on its main dangers and how to handle and use it safely.

NURSING BILL

At a meeting chaired by Mr Roland Boyle, Minister of State (Health), a majority of the Briggs Co-ordinating Committee on Nursing agreed a compromise solution that there should be enabling powers in the Bill under which some new committees will be named specifically. The proposed legislation will establish a Central Council for the UK and four national boards with midwifery committees at Central Council and national boards and a health visiting committee serving both levels.

There would be a general enabling power for Health Ministers to set up additional committees at Central Council level. The following new committees would be named: an education committee, committees for district nursing and mental nursing, an advisory committee for clinical nursing studies, and committees for finance and discipline. The Minister proposes to give an undertaking in Parliament to set up these committees during the passage of the Bill.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON POSTGRADUATE TRAINING FOR GENERAL PRACTICE

The Joint Committee on Postgraduate Training for General Practice and the Royal College of General Practitioners have approved the Northwick Park (Scheme B) Vocational Training Scheme. The vocational training schemes at Scarborough and Bradford have been re-approved. These schemes are recognized by the Royal College of General Practitioners for the purpose of the MRCGP examination.

CORRECTION

In the January 1978 issue of the *Journal* the cost of services per person registered with doctors under the NHS in the Hereford and Worcester area was stated to be 6.86p per person for general medical services. This should, of course, have read £6.86 per person.
