One of the biggest problems in vocational training for general practice has been the need to design courses appropriate for doctors preparing to work in the widest of all medical roles. The need is to decide what subjects are important and what priority objectives should be.

This Occasional Paper comes from the Course Organizers and Regional Advisers Group in the Oxford Region, which has a distinguished record in developing vocational training. Based on widespread consultation within the Region, the group achieved a consensus on its priorities, which it lists under five headings: primary care, communication, organization, professional values, and personal and professional growth. It therefore provides a useful basis for discussion in other regions.


DOCTORS TALKING TO PATIENTS
