USE: All grades of essential hypertension and renovascular hypertension. Congestive neart failure (adjunctive therapy).

PRESENTATION: Tablets containing 2.5mg, 5mg, 10mg or 20mg (sinopril ('Zestril'), DOSAGE AND ADMINISTRATION: Hypertension - Adults including elderly; initially 25mg daily, a 2.5mg dose seldom achieves a therapeutic response; adjust dose according to response.
