

### **`HELPING PEOPLE CHANGE' TRAINING PROGRAMME**

This training provides all PHC professionals with an understanding of risk management and health promotion, to help them motivate people to make healthy lifestyle changes. It is supported by a range of resources, both for the professional and the patient.

Effective strategies are offered to support patients who have identified unhealthy aspects of their lifestyle. The training uses a model which recognises the stages which an individual goes through when trying to make behavioural change.

### Defeat Depression Action Week Fun Run


