



Who regulates our medicines? The role of the Medicines Control Agency

Doctors write prescriptions for medicines every day but who controls these powerful treatments? The regulatory authority for human medicines in the UK is Health Ministers, whose executive arm is the Medicine Control Agency (MCA). Its primary function is to safeguard public health by ensuring that all medicines - both branded and non-branded - on the UK market, meet acceptable standards of safety, quality and efficacy.

Licensing medicines

Medicines (unless exempted) need a marketing authorisation before they can be made available to the public. This includes new drugs, versions of existing products and all variations to existing licences. Applications are made, usually by pharmaceutical companies, to the MCA. Its 450 staff, including over 50 doctors, 90 pharmacists and many other scientists have the task of balancing the benefits of medicines against possible risks, before they are approved for use.

Expert advice

Assessment of medicinal products, particularly new drugs, is a very specialised activity and the MCA often seeks the advice of experts such as the Committee on Safety of Medicines (CSM). During the process of authorisation a Summary of Product Characteristics (SPC, formally the Data Sheet) is agreed which provides detailed information covering the clinical, pharmaceutical and pharmacological profile of the new medicine. This information is summarised in the monographs of the British National Formulary.

Monitoring medicines on the market

After medicines have been authorised, the MCA continues to monitor them and keeps records of side effects reported. The voluntary adverse reaction alerting scheme, the "Yellow Card Scheme", makes a key contribution so that potential problems can be quickly recognised and dealt with by making changes, if necessary, to the marketing authorisation. New information about medicines and their potential adverse effects is passed back to doctors via the newsletter, *Current Problems in Pharmacovigilance*.

Inspection and enforcement

All UK manufacturers, wholesalers and importers of medicines also have to be licensed. Regular inspections of their premises ensure that the required standards of quality assurance are maintained. Suspected illegal activities are investigated and those breaking the law may be prosecuted.

Better medicines, faster

Rigorous medicines control is a key part of protecting public health in the UK. New and better medicines are vitally important for treating many illnesses. The MCA recognises this and, whilst applying strict standards of safety, quality and efficacy laid down by the Medicines Act and EC legislation, it also works hard to see that treatments that could save lives are licensed and made available to patients as quickly as possible.


Why Vacuum Autoclaves?

Conventional bench top autoclaves should not be used to sterilize wrapped instruments or textile products. So how can a practice safely sterilize instruments in paper peel-packs? A Vacuum Autoclave will provide the solution here's why:

An instrument is sterilized by exposure to saturated steam, under pressure, in the total absence of air, at a sufficiently high temperature, for a sufficient period of time. In practice, this means at a temperature of either 134 degrees C for 4 minutes at 2.1 bar pressure, or 121 degrees C for 20 minutes at 1.1 bar pressure.

Non-Vacuum Displacement Autoclaves

Conventional non-vacuum steam autoclaves have no air removal phase, and rely instead on the passive displacement of air from the chamber as the steam pressure increases prior to the sterilization cycle. If paper pouches are used to wrap instruments for sterilization, or if there are complex cavities or small lumen within individual instruments, there is a danger that pockets of contaminated air may become trapped, thus preventing proper steam penetration. For this reason, non-vacuum bench top autoclaves should only ever be used to sterilize unwrapped



instruments and even then, only for those instruments of simple design and construction having no complex internal cavities or lumen. Such non-vacuum autoclaves are sometimes referred to as displacement autoclaves.

Vacuum Autoclaves

If a bench top autoclave is to be used to sterilize either instruments in paper pouches, or textile products, or instruments with lumen, the air from within the autoclave chamber must be forcibly evacuated prior to the commencement of the steam sterilization cycle. This can only be achieved in practice using an autoclave equipped with a presterilization vacuum cycle.

The actual sterilization cycle of a vacuum autoclave is preceded by a phase during which a vacuum pump is used to evacuate the air contained within both the chamber and the instrument load. The chamber air is drawn out through a purge valve, to ensure air removal, to a negative pressure of minus 0.65 bar. At the end of the sterilization cycle an equalization phase takes place to normalize the chamber pressure, thus allowing the door to be opened. Because the pre- and post-vacuum cycles are so efficient, instruments in paper pouches may safely be sterilized in a vacuum autoclave.

Chamber size

Autoclave chamber size is usually referred to either as dimensional or by capacity. For example a chamber size of 250mm diameter by 450mm depth will have a capacity of 21 litres. Vacuum autoclaves tend to have larger chambers because wrapped loads are usually more bulky.

Printer/recorder

Although not an essential requirement, most autoclaves are offered with a printer/recorder. This means that a permanent record of every cycle completed is kept, with an indication of whether or not sterilization conditions were achieved.

The 'CE' mark - Medical Devices Directive 93/42/EEC

The provisions of the Medical Devices Directive 93/42/EEC become mandatory in the UK in June 1998. In anticipation of this only those products carrying the CE mark indicating compliance with the Directive should be considered.

A Vacuum Autoclave gives the busy practice the scope and flexibility to respond to changing demands for 'ready-to-use' sterile instruments and equipment. Given the potential consequences of inadequate sterilization, vacuum autoclaves may well be seen as essential equipment in every surgery.
